



"The FamilySearch Research Wiki is a free, online genealogical guide created and maintained by FamilySearch, a non-profit organization. Articles included are locality pages for countries around the world and topic pages that include pertinent genealogy record types explaining how to use the record, what it contains, and how to find it. It contains links to genealogy databases, websites, other resources, research strategies, and genealogical guidance to assist in the search for your ancestors."

Step-by-Step Pennsylvania Research, 1850-1910

- 1. Contact living relatives.
- 2. Online census records.
- 3. Death records, obituary and cemetery records online.
- 4. Births and marriages online.
- 5. Military records online.
- 6: Look for church records online.
- 7. Wills and probate.
- 8. Immigration and naturalization records online.
- 9. Land records online.
- 10. Printed local histories or biographies online.
- 11. Historical or genealogical societies.
- 12: Use other FamilySearch tools.
- 13: Study the Research Wiki pages for any county in Pennsylvania.

The Steps are in the box.

Step 1: Find out everything possible from living relatives and their family records.





Gives tips about gathering information from family sources.



A few additional suggestions

- Talk to family members. Ask questions.
 Record or note down the answers.
- Record stories.
- Find photographs and identify people in them.
- Find personal letters, journals, cards, and other written materials.
- Find Bibles, baby books, family records, newspaper clippings, wedding and birth announcements, funeral programs, school papers, passports, medical records.

Key #2--Choose

Review the known information you have gathered. Pinpoint accurate facts when possible; note suspicious items.

Decide who you are looking for.




Decide what information you need to find.

Craft a research goal: Examples: I want to find the military record of my great-grandfather in World War I. What is the exact date of birth of my great-grandmother?

Step 2: Find ancestors in every possible census record, 1850-1950, online.



Gives search tips and links to all censuses for the state on FamilySearch and Ancestry, as well as state censuses, when available.


Step 3: Try to find additional details in death certificates, Social Security, obituary and cemetery records online.

- Gives search tips and examples for death certificates, death index entries, SS Death and Applications and Claims indexes, and cemetery records.
- Gives links to collections online for all of the above.
- Gives a link for where to write to get records.
- Gives links for more information on the Wiki.



Step 4: Search for county birth and marriage records online.

- Gives date vital records registration began in the state. See county pages for more information.
- Gives examples of birth and marriage indexes.
- Gives links to state birth and marriage indexes.
- Gives a link to the state counties listings.
- Gives links to How to find [State] . . . Records articles in the Wiki.



Step 5: Search military records: World War I and World War II draft cards.

- Gives examples of draft cards.
- Gives search tips and links to draft registration indexes.
- Gives links to state military records.




Step 6: Look for church records online.

- Gives links to further information.




Step 7: Search for online wills and probate packets.

- Gives links to further information.




Step 8: If any ancestor was an immigrant, search immigration and naturalization records online.

- Gives examples of passenger list indexes and lists.
- Gives links to state immigration records.
- Gives link to US immigration records, including cultural groups, passports and naturalization records.
- Gives links to more information about state emigration and immigration.



Step 9: Search land records online.

- Gives information about what the records contain.
- Gives links to US and State land records.
- Gives links to more information.




Step 10: Search for printed local histories or biography collections online.

- Gives links to online repositories.
- Gives tips on how to find histories on FamilySearch.
- Gives links to online local histories and biography collections.
- Gives links to more information.

PRO TIP

- Use the Internet Archive (https://archive.org) to find histories and biographies.
- Google state university libraries' card catalogs to find histories and biographies.
- Use Google Books to find histories and biographies.





Step 11: Contact a local historical or genealogical society.

PRO TIPS for Better Research

- For larger cities, click on the Wiki page for the city for local information and sources.
- Scan through the articles in the Topics box for the US, the state you are researching in, and the county. Be a Wiki clicker!
- Never discount a possible source type. It only takes a minute to win it.
- Have a scorched earth policy when it comes to finding information.
- Start at the known location and move outward in circles—5-10 miles at a time.



Key #4-Evaluate

- Review the records. View original documents/images whenever possible. Snip and save!
- Decide what the information tells you: Who? When? Where? What?
- Organize the information. Compare it to other information.
- Come to a conclusion about your research goal.







Key #5-Share

- Create a new profile page, if necessary, or update Family Tree or Ancestry or other program by attaching the source to the person.
- Create a memory, if appropriate.
- Write a blog that you can share your research on.
- Use social media or FamilySearch Groups or Friends to share your information with friends and family.

Do it again for another ancestor! Find 'em all!
